COMMUNIQUE

Members of the Cassowary Coast Local Marine Advisory Committee (LMAC) met in Innisfail on 14 July 2016 for their sixth meeting of the 2015 – 2018 term.

Update on Reef Trust

Kevin Gale from the Department of Environment provided an update to LMAC members on Reef Trust via telephone. The Australian Government has committed \$210 million over 2014–2019 to support initiatives that improve water quality, coastal ecosystem health and species protection. The Reef Trust is one of a range of mechanisms assisting in the delivery of the Reef 2050 Plan.

Investments will be phased over the duration of Reef Trust, and consultations with key interest groups are ongoing. Cassowary Coast LMAC members expressed a keen interest in the consultations. Issues of particular interest included investments in improving soil health to minimise fertiliser use, and wider communication of success stories resulting from the current and previous Reef protection initiatives. LMAC members recommended that the approach to water quality improvement must go beyond nutrient inputs, and should include assessment of the wider social and environmental systems that may assist in improving water quality.

Shipping in the Reef

Members discussed the risks associated with shipping inside the Great Barrier Reef lagoon. Information provided by representatives from Maritime Safety Queensland sought to correct a common misperception, noting that it is safer for ships to travel inside the Reef where they could drop anchor easily and receive assistance from nearby ports should any loss of power or steerage occur. The waters of the Coral Sea outside the Reef are too deep for anchoring, and they are much further from assistance if needed. A report on shipping statistics (including risk management) and ports in the Great Barrier Reef region is available.

Protecting herbivores poster

Recovery of reefs after the 2016 mass coral bleaching event are dependent on herbivorous fish, which remove algae from the substrate and allow new corals to grow. A new poster was circulated, asking fishers to voluntarily not take key species.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be held on 14 September 2016 at the Kurrimine Beach pub, with a potential presentation by a shark researcher (To be confirmed).
